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the wearer. Set wrinkles usually occur because the garment is too large or too small for the wearer and the garment hangs or sags when worn. **Line:** This refers to the alignment of the structural lines of the garment with the natural lines of the body. Side seams of the garment should hang like a plumb line down the centre of the side of the body i.e. should be perpendicular to the floor. Balance: When the garment is balanced, it is in equilibrium. The right and left side of the garment appear evenly balanced or symmetrical when viewed from the front, back or side. Ease: This refers to the amount of "roominess" in a garment. There are two kinds of ease: · Fitting ease · Design ease
